

Plain Language Summary for New Source Review (NSR) Renewal Application for Air New Source Review Permit Number 1818

The following summary is provided for this pending air permit application being reviewed by the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality as required by 30 Texas Administrative Code Chapter 39. The information provided in this summary may change during the technical review of the application and are not federal enforceable representations of the permit application.

Viterra USA Grain, LLC (CN603434374) has submitted an application for renewal of permit number 1818. The grain elevator (RN102537891) receives, stores, and ships grain at 14410 FM 2209, San Perlita, Willacy County.

This renewal will authorize the continued operation of the grain receiving, handling, storage, and shipping equipment. Viterra USA Grain, LLC has listed in the application the pollutants and amounts that will be emitted for each facility. Below is the total amount for each pollutant that is proposed to be emitted each year for all the facilities. Viterra USA Grain, LLC has certified there will be no changes to the permit. The following permitted emission rates will remain the same.

The facilities being renewed continue to be controlled by drop socks when shipping grain and choke feeding is utilized for receiving operations. Annual grain throughput will continue to be limited to no more than 500,000 tons per year (approximately 16.67 million bushels per year).

Elevator legs and conveying operations are enclosed. Spillage of any raw products, finished products, or waste products will continue to be picked up and properly disposed of on a daily basis.

All in-plant roads, truck loading, and unloading areas, parking areas, and other traffic areas will be sprinkled with water, and/or paved (with a cohesive hard surface), and cleaned as necessary to maintain compliance with TCEQ rules and regulations.

Records will continue to be required to demonstrate compliance with the annual grain throughput limitations.
